from the Pastor...



How quickly we go from the hopes and promise of Jesus' coming in the season of Advent, to the joy and wonder of Christ's coming and living among us at Christmas, to the manifestations of Jesus as God -now in the

flesh appearing-manifesting- during Epiphany. Very soon we will experience another church season's beginning this year, as we receive the ashes on Ash Wednesday (on February 14th this year) and enter into the inward and penitential meditations and self-examination that are significant parts of the Lenten seasons' journey. It can be a very fast ten weeks!

Many of us, in truth, were still trying to fathom how our God has combined things we would rather keep separate, in the sending of his Son Jesus to us; the glory <u>and</u> the scandal of God taking on human flesh, in becoming one of us for instance. We feel more secure when holy things are kept 'holy' and separate. It can seem confusing when the holy and the profane come together; like in a smelly, dirty stable and when the God of all creation and eternity is kept warmed by animal bodies, held and fed by his mother's milk-his own creation! That of course is <u>normal</u> for us...but, God??

As Thomas Merton, a famous writer and Trappist monk says, in Jesus "eternity enters into time, and time, sanctified, is caught up into eternity." Time, human flesh, water, <u>all</u> of nature has

been made holy by Jesus' coming here. It is a lot to take in. In fact, I don't think we often do take it the magnitude of it all.

The rapid change of church seasons can be disconcerting as well! We are living this story now, the church—in time. The goal of paying attention to the church year and the church calendar is to recover a more ancient way of looking at time and the mysterious relationship between the spiritual and the earthly realms. We are reminded that as church, we are now Christ's body in the world. We are in the world but we must find a way of navigating life so that we are not simply of it. Instead, we are travelers-aliens here-sent for a purpose—to do God's will and to make God's redemption plan known to all.

Life is messy, earthly living and the daily straddling of our lives and our faith can get messy—there's no doubt. We succeed and we also fail at the integration of both. We pick ourselves up and Jesus dusts us off, feeds us, and sends us back out there to do our best. The church calendar can be a way of calling us out of the demands of the world; of reminding us of who we are and whose we are.

I pray, though right now it may feel like we are in a toboggan, quickly sliding downhill through one church season after another, that the rhythm of the church year <u>will</u> give you some structure, some traction, some comfort and lead you <u>always</u> <u>back</u> to your Lord, who loves you with a love that is both tender and relentless- completely unwavering.

May we marinate a bit more in the stories that have enacted our salvation as we re-enact them in the Church year, for these stories are the backdrop, the foundation of our lives.

All services will also be livestreamed.
